Since moving to Papillion in 2011, my family and I never planned on joining a church. My wife and I were raised as Lutherans, but we stopped practicing our faith after high school. Like many people, we became focused on things like careers, education, and money.

Despite achieving those things, we still felt something missing.

Then one day, out of the blue, our son looked at me and said, "Dad, I want to go to church." I believe that was God's way of getting my attention because nothing else would have worked. When my son asked, I knew it was serious.



We began looking for churches in our area, and Trinity Church caught our eye because of the music and the welcoming environment shown on their website. We hadn't been to church in about 25 years, so we didn't know what to expect. But when we arrived, everyone greeted us warmly and made us feel like we belonged.

My wife, who's more outgoing, started helping teach children about Jesus, and I got involved with the Tech team. We also began observing the Sabbath and applying the lessons from the "A Different Way" series to our lives. Our outlook started to change, although I still have a lot of work to do.

I started researching and found truths that felt like they were meant for me, even though they were written nearly 2,000 years ago.

We believe it is no coincidence that by the beginning of 2026, the new Sarpy County Museum is scheduled to open on the land we sold them that lies between Trinity and 90th street looking east from our building. That gives us joy because it will serve as a dramatic contrast between what was in the past - the museum - and what already is and will be even more in the future - a living, breathing, joy-filled Trinity Church!

These days, because of mobility issues, we attend church online every Sunday. We love the music team, the videos of all the exciting things that are happening all the time at Trinity, and the phenomenal staff and volunteers who work tirelessly to be sure that all people from birth until last days are presented opportunities to serve and be served. We love that our mission, Connecting People to Christ, is embedded in the culture of Trinity. That focus makes it easy for all who attend to bring others and that as we move forward together, we keep increasing these opportunities. Most important of all to the two of us, Pastor Matt, and all who preach, focus on teaching from the gospel in ways that relate the Bible's lessons to their relevance and necessity for all of us in our own daily lives.

When we were on national staff, Shelly and I traveled the country for the church. We saw heart-breaking numbers of churches who had lost their focus and their passion for connecting their neighbors to Christ. Instead of churches, they were becoming tradition-bound museums, focused on the past. They seemed oblivious that the death of their church was near because of inward focus only on themselves. In vivid contrast, it both of us rejoice that here at Trinity we are excited about our mission and our future. To make our future even more relevant to God's work in and around Papillion, we must be a living, giving church. Over our own lives we have learned an interesting thing about that; with God, it is always *you first*!

Matthew chapter 6 is one of our personal foundation Bible verses. In on chapter Jesus talks about giving to the needy, teaches us the Lord's Prayer, fasting, not worrying and giving to the church. We have been tithers plus for years. In Matthew 6:21 Jesus says it very plainly, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." Put plainly, the things on which you spend your money show your true commitments. I remember our decision to step out in faith and give 10% of our net income to the church "back then." It was scary. But an amazing thing happened that year. Somehow, we got more back in increased incidental income that year than the 10% we tithed! I know. We couldn't believe it either. It made no sense. But it's not God's job to make sense to us; it's our job to trust and believe in him with all our hearts, minds and strength. While we give our tithe to Trinity's annual budget to financially support Trinity's great staff and volunteers in our mission to Connect People with Christ, we also recognize that if we want this wonderful ministry to continue to expand, we have to pay off debt on the amazing facility that makes it all possible for us.

Now is the time for us to step up and make a huge dent in what we still owe on Trinity so we can continue to grow in every way - physically, spiritually, in Christian fellowship, children's youth, women's, men's and small group ministries. It just make sense that the larger the chunk of debt we can retire, the more quickly we can expand the physical facilities to support our growing ministries and attendance. Paying off the building gives us a chance to give even more to God's work. It will be, for each of us, over and above giving not a substitute for redirecting whatever we already give to the building fund. We ask you to give with glad hearts and generosity.

For those of you who are retired like us but want to ensure the future of Trinity's mission of Connecting People to Christ, there is a special way in which those of you who have IRA's can support this mission. It is called the Qualified Charitable Distribution Rule. Since 2006, the IRS has allowed retired IRA to make tax-free donations of their required minimum distributions (RMDs) directly to Trinity. The benefit to you is that you pay no tax on the RMD. The benefit to Trinity and to you is that you can give the RMDs as a part of your "over and above" giving to the Building Fund. Shelly and I have been doing this since the Building Fund was begun. We urge you to prayerfully consider joining us in this effort. A single phone call to your accountant or investment advisor before year's end can make this possible.
